PORT ST. LUCIE – The road to recovery from substance abuse and mental health issues can often be a long, arduous journey, and treatment can be expensive.

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Volunteers from New Horizons, and a large assembly of students from Fort Pierce Central High School, made certain that participants received nourishment, thanks to Natalie's Orchid Island Juice and Panera Bread, and encouragement to stay the course and cross the finish line.

The family-friendly atmosphere also ensured a wide range of age groups that, included 90-year-old James Woolam. Overall, 27-year-old Josh Negron finished first among the males, with a time of 19:27 and 29-year-old Kay Trager finished first among females, with a time of 21:43.

All finishers received ribbons, with medals going to the top three in each age bracket, and first-place overall winners in several categories were awarded gift cards to Berry Fresh, Spiro's Taverna and First Watch.
